Mercy Perspectives

As we welcome the arrival of spring and all the hope and rebirth that comes with the season, Mission of Mercy also celebrates with hope and thanksgiving our ability to continue to provide much needed medical care to the uninsured and underinsured members of our community.

We are pleased to report that the restructured clinic schedule we announced last fall has enabled us to continue to serve our patients with minimal disruption. By shifting some of our smaller clinics to our larger sites and relocating to larger facilities, we have been able to maximize our resources and expand the number of patients we see.

"The decision to eliminate our Thurmont and Mt. Airy sites was not made lightly," says David Liddle, Mission of Mercy's executive director. "But given the economic realities we are facing, we believe the decision presents us with the best opportunity to serve the majority of our patients with the least amount of inconvenience." Liddle says patients are reporting that thanks to the geographic proximity of many clinic sites, they are not facing significant transportation hurdles that would prevent them from getting the care they need.



"We will continue to evaluate our clinic schedules

to ensure that we provide the same level of care that we have always given our patients, while also demonstrating to our generous donors that we are good stewards of the resources shared with us," Liddle says.

### Community Rallies to Save M.O.M.'s Dental Clinics

Just when it looked as if funding shortages would force the closure of Mission of Mercy's dental clinics in Maryland and Pennsylvania, scores of generous businesses and individuals stepped up to provide an 11th hour rescue of the program. Thanks to their generosity, we

have received enough funding to keep our dental programs operating through the end of 2010 and into the first part of 2011. Once again we find ourselves humbled and blessed by the incredible generosity of our friends and supporters. Thank you.

Mission of Mercy's mobile medical clinics seek to restore dignity to the sick, poor, and homeless by providing free basic healthcare and "healing through Love." This mission is accomplished primarily through a team of volunteer medical, administrative and hospitality workers.

Services provided include medical care for both acute and chronic conditions, oral health care, and pharmaceuticals. # **Volunteer Profile: Michael Dean**

# It didn't take Michael Dean long to become a dedicated volunteer for Mission of Mercy. In fact, it took just over an hour.

Two years ago, he attended a Coffee with Mom tour at the Frederick clinic site. During the tour, he recalls seeing clinic volunteers completely overwhelmed by the number of patients who needed help, especially in the prenatal clinic where 50 women were scheduled, and another 50 were on the waiting list. So after his tour was over, he jumped right in and started making copies. He's been involved ever since.

"I was hooked immediately," he says. "I completely fell in love with the place."

Although his first volunteer effort focused on administrative tasks, Michael quickly realized he could contribute in other ways. Having spent six months studying in Mexico, he knew he could call upon his Spanish-speaking skills – however rusty they were -- to help patients communicate with the medical staff.

"I never really became fluent with Spanish so I had to work really hard to bring it back," he recalls. But as a researcher at the National Cancer Institute, Michael has found that honing his Spanish at Mission of Mercy has proven to be invaluable to him in other ways as well. During mission trips to Guatemala with his church, Michael has become connected with the country's Children's Cancer Hospital and he has become inspired to find ways to get the Latino community involved in clinical trials and studies, where he says "they are an under-served community."

Michael currently volunteers two days a month at the Frederick clinic, using vacation days as well as allotted sabbatical time to work it into his schedule. "We are allowed to take sabbaticals, but I've never done so. So I said to my boss, 'I can leave for a year or I can spend a day or two each month helping out in the community.' He said he couldn't afford to have me leave for year, so this works for both of us."

And it works for the Mission of Mercy patients who rely on Michael and all the clinic volunteers to get the medical care they need. "We all work together to make the mission work, because as wonderful a medical director as Dr. Sullivan is, if he can't communicate with his patients he can't help them," Michael says. "It is amazing to be part of a family of people who have wonderful hearts and a genuine desire to give back. I really wish every American could spend a day in this place and see what one person with a vision can accomplish – without government help."

Despite the non-stop pace of an eight-hour day at the clinic, Michael says he leaves feeling exhilarated. "Even though my day starts early and we work non-stop, I feel refreshed," he says. It is a reflection of the bidirectional flow of God's love to which Mission of Mercy Foundress Gianna Talone-Sullivan often refers. "We go there to help people, but they all bless us and pray for us," Michael says. "I get way more out of it than I give."

### **David Liddle Assumes Role of Executive Director of Mission of Mercy's Programs in Maryland and Pennsylvania**

After almost four years as Mission of Mercy's executive director, Linda Ryan resigned her position effective Dec. 31, 2009. David Liddle, who served as MOM's first executive director before assuming the role of director of expansion and chief financial officer in 2006, will once again assume the organization's leadership duties while also continuing his work as CFO.



Ryan will continue to serve on Mission of Mercy's Carroll County Leadership Council but felt it necessary to resign from the demands of the executive director position so she would have more time to devote

#### Blessed by Grace & Love of Supporters

Nearly 400 people attended M.O.M.'s 3rd Annual Community Awareness Breakfast. Themed "Weaving a Tapestry of Grace," the event was held at the beautiful Pointe Hilton Squaw Peak Resort where attendees gathered to listen to stories of healing and hope by clinic volunteers, including Dixie Melby and Tomas Abrate.

Catherine Amiot, M.O.M.-AZ executive director, invited attendees to join Mission of Mercy in its dream to create a compassionate community of health and wholeness. "Your support is directly transforming the lives of people just like us who desperately need to experience the miracle of God's grace," said Amiot. "Together we are God's hand-chosen threads in our community's beautiful tapestry of grace."

Larry Hall, M.O.M.-AZ Leadership Council member, made an exciting announcement about 2010 West Valley expansion plans facilitated by generous lead gifts from Thunderbirds Charities and the Foster and Lynne Friess Family Foundation. In early 2010, the BHHS Legacy Foundation also made a multi-year commitment of support toward this effort which is now in the active planning phase.

These new and returning partners will allow Arizona to purchase a second medical van, a key component to extending its services into the Far West Valley, an area that has the highest number of newly unemployed individuals and home repossessions. M.O.M.-AZ also anticipates adding an additional service day in 2010 and seeing 1,000 more patients during the first full year of this important expansion.

### Texas

Charity League, a non-profit organization comprised of 40 women who annually raise funds for charitable projects in the Corpus Christi area, has selected Mission of Mercy Texas as its 2010 grant recipient. The organization's volunteers are helping raise \$175,000 to purchase a new mobile vehicle for the Texas program. Through a huge outpouring in the community, \$193,000 has been raised to date and additional pledges should bring the total to \$200,000.

As part of its fundraising efforts, Charity League sponsored a luncheon and fashion show featuring the creations of New York designer Josie Natori. A crowd of nearly 780 people – the largest charity event in Corpus Christi – attended the event. Themed "La Vida Verde," the luncheon featured beautiful flower arrangements on each table that were made from pages of magazines and crafted into exotic looking flowers.

The IRS allows taxpayers to claim a tax deduction of the value of a vehicle up to \$500 without documentation, or if we sell the vehicle for more than \$500, you will receive a completed IRS tax form 1098-C, with the vehicle's actual value, for your tax purposes.

A specialist handles the details of vehicle transactions, including free pick up, towing and sales.The vehicle does not
