Our Mission

Mission of Mercy's mobile medical clinics seek to restore dignity to the sick, poor, and homeless by providing free basic healthcare and "healing through Love." This mission is accomplished primarily through a team of volunteer medical, administrative and hospitality workers.

Our History

Founded in 1994, Mission of Mercy is an independent, 501(c)(3), nonsectarian, community-based organization. Services provided include medical care for both acute and chronic conditions, oral health care, and pharmaceuticals. All services are provided free, regardless of race, color, creed, national origin or religion. All funding is derived from private donations, including individuals, community groups, churches and foundations.

Difficult times bring additional patients to Mission of Mercy during our 15th anniversary year

s our nation's economic woes deepen, Mission of Mercy is experiencing a significant increase in the number of patients who visit our mobile medical clinics. More and more members of our community, many of whom have either lost their jobs or who are experiencing cuts in their pay and/or benefits, are turning to Mission of Mercy as their only option for free health care, dental care and free prescription medications.

Amid these challenging times, Mission of Mercy is celebrating its 15th anniversary in 2009, marking an incredible journey of faith and service by our visionary foundress, Dr. Gianna Talone Sullivan and her husband, Dr. Michael Sullivan, and scores of dedicated volunteers.

Since 1994, Mission of Mercy has grown from an organization with six patients and one clinic site to a program with 17 sites in four states, sites that are impacting hundreds of thousands of lives every year -- literally. In Maryland and Pennsylvania alone, we have had more than 127,000 patients visit our clinics since our program began. In 2008, we saw 1,516 more patients at these sites than we did in 2007.

In 2008, the U.S. Census Bureau reported the number of uninsured Americans was close to 45 million. Even those with insurance are finding it more and more difficult to pay the cost of deductibles and co-pays, thus giving rise to a growing number of underinsured members of our community.

How ironic, therefore, that the United States, which leads the world in medical, surgical and pharmaceutical breakthroughs, finds many of its citizens delaying basic routine healthcare. Instead of seeking early treatment for chronic, treatable conditions, many patients wait until their illnesses have reached the acute stage and require a visit to the emergency room. Even more tragically, however, those who wait too long to get treatment may be putting their very lives in danger: A 2008 Families USA study revealed that more than one working-age Marylander died every day in 2006 due to a lack of health insurance.

As businesses close their doors, individuals and families are struggling to make ends meet, often sacrificing health care for life's daily basic necessities. Mission of Mercy is bridging the gap for many of our friends and neighbors who have either no health insurance or too little insurance and is providing what more and more people need: "restoration of dignity and healing through love."

Mission of Mercy is forever grateful for the financial contributions received from individuals, organizations and foundations, as well as for the in-kind donations from volunteers and the church host sites. Your support is needed and greatly appreciated now and in the years to come.

News and notes from our Mission of Mercy sites



To demonstrate the 15 years of growth in Mission of Mercy's programs in **Maryland** and **Pennsylvania**, we invite you to take a ride on our mobile medical van to learn more about what occurs at our clinic sites:

Brunswick: Opened in the summer of 1994, our clinic site at the Faith Baptist Church draws as many as 20 percent of its patients from communities in West Virginia. Patients have been known to arrive as early as 2 a.m. in order to receive the care and compassion offered by Mission of Mercy and our cadre of volunteers. Faith Baptist Church also operates a clothing bank on our clinic days.

Frederick: In addition to providing medical, physical therapy, and dental (thanks to the support of the Frederick Dental Society) services, the Frederick site at the Church of the Brethren opened in the fall of 1997 and is the only Mercy of Mercy clinic location that also offers prenatal care. Demand for these and other services makes this one of our largest clinic locations. Church of the Brethren volunteers also prepare bagged lunches for our patients.


Mt. Airy: Our site at Calvary United Methodist Church opened in the fall of 2002 and enables us to see patients from a four-county area. More than 700 residents from Frederick, Carroll, Howard and Montgomery counties visited the Mission of Mercy mobile medical clinic during our monthly visits to Mt. Airy in 2008.

Reisterstown: Given its proximity to Baltimore, our clinic site at the Reisterstown United Methodist Church might be considered our "United Nations" location. The site opened in the fall of 1995 and has numerous interpreters who volunteer their services to translate for patients who speak languages including Russian, French and Spanish.



Frederick Church of Brethren

Taneytown: Our site at St. Joseph's Catholic Church opened in the spring of 1996. The church sponsors on-site food and clothing banks during our regularly scheduled clinic visits, which provide additional assistance to our patients, many of whom are struggling to provide life's basic necessities to their families.



Our Lady of Mount Carmel, Thurmont

Thurmont: Perhaps more so than any other Mission of Mercy site, the Thurmont clinic at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic Church has the feeling of a small-town doctor's office. Opened in the summer of 1994, the Thurmont location is in the northern and more rural part of Frederick County. The patients we see in Thurmont return to us on a regular basis and are the working poor we so often hear about who are struggling to earn a living wage but whose employers do not offer any medical coverage.

Westminster: The Human Services Program Barrel House is the host site for our very first Mission of Mercy location in Maryland. The site opened in 1994 and we have now seen more than 34,000 patients at this location. Westminster is our only location with a permanent dental suite and has received strong support from the Carroll County Dental Society.



Gettysburg Foursquare Church

Gettysburg: Congregants from a ministerium of churches in the Gettysburg area volunteer to prepare bagged lunches for the patients at our clinic site located at the Gettysburg Foursquare Church, which opened in the fall of 1995. For some of our patients, these bagged lunches represent their only substantial meal of the day.

Harrisburg: Mission of Mercy continues to receive strong support for its medical and dental services at our site located at Christ Lutheran Church. The site opened in the fall of 2002 and continues to receive vital support from the Harrisburg Area Dental Society.

News from Arizona and Texas:

Arizona held its second "Mercy in the Morning" breakfast on Dec. 3, 2008 and raised more than \$275,000 in current and multi-year financial commitments. The breakfast drew a record crowd of nearly 300 people, of whom nearly two-thirds were new friends of Mission of Mercy.

Among the highlights of the morning's festivities was an announcement by Jerry Wissink, CEO of BHHS Legacy Foundation, that his organization has awarded Mission of Mercy – Arizona a \$60,000 challenge grant to help expand its operations.

The need for expansion has never been greater. Visits to Mission of Mercy's Arizona clinics were up more than 14 percent in 2008 as compared to the previous year and our clinicians dispensed 14,576 free medications during that time. Some of this increase in services can be attributed to a fourth clinic site expansion into south-central Phoenix in July, where in just six months more than 400 patient visits were recorded.



All indications tell us the need will continue to grow. Data from the 2008 Arizona Health Survey, compiled by St. Luke's Health Initiatives and other community groups, suggests that more than one million Arizonans are struggling with medical debt, causing many families to postpone or skip urgent and routine medical care and to not fill critical prescriptions needed to manage their health conditions. According to a March 2008 Mission of Mercy - AZ Patient Satisfaction Survey, 97 percent of our patients indicated they would have sought care in a local emergency room if a Mission of Mercy clinic was not available.



Mission of Mercy – Texas celebrated its first anniversary of service to the Coastal Bend area of Texas in September. During its first full year of service, the Mission of Mercy mobile clinic recorded 2,038 patient visits and dispensed 2,900 free prescriptions at its five sites located in the Corpus Christi area.

The generosity of the Coastal Bend community has been remarkable. Start-up costs were funded by three \$100,000 donations from local non-profit organizations and there were other donations from foundations, individuals and private corporations. Local attorney Bob Hilliard donated office space and Doctors' Regional Hospital, Driscoll Children's Hospital and CHRISTUS-Spohn Hospital have donated x-ray and other laboratory services. To date, more than 100 volunteers have offered their services to Mission of Mercy.

Additional physicians, nurses, pharmacists, interpreters and support volunteers are still sought after as the need for Mission of Mercy's services continues to grow in these challenging times.

Profiles in A closer look at the people who inspire our Mission of Mercy

Sharon Y. Alongi, MD

For Sharon Alongi, a small article she saw in a local newspaper 15 years ago became her personal mustard seed.

The story told of a newly launched community service organization that was looking for doctors who could donate some of their time to see patients who were uninsured or underinsured. The program, she thought, "looked like an interesting opportunity" so she responded to the ad.

Within days, Dr. Alongi received a phone call from Dr. Michael Sullivan, Mission of Mercy's medical director. He explained more about the program's desire to restore dignity to the sick, poor and homeless by providing free basic health care and "healing through Love." It was a message that resonated deeply with Dr. Alongi, who once had the privilege to work with Mother Theresa amid the utter poverty of Calcutta, India.

Dr. Alongi was the first physician to "sign on" to help Mission of Mercy. She began by donating her services one day a week at the Westminster clinic site and continues her service today by working as a physician for Mission of Mercy one day per month. And her service continues even when she's not at the clinic. Dr. Alongi invites Mission of Mercy to refer patients to her Family Medicine practice in Westminster and consistently ensures that unused sample

pharmaceuticals from her private practice are donated to Mission of Mercy.

Dr. Alongi's selfless service to Mission of Mercy is a reflection of her entire life. A single mother of two children she adopted from Mexico and Peru, Dr. Alongi works with

Catastrophic Health and the Department of Social Services to provide medical assistance to disabled and mentally-challenged members of her community. And despite the demands of her successful private practice, she continues to visit her home-bound patients.

The small seed she planted 15 years ago when she responded to the call for help has grown into a large mustard plant that now serves the poorest of the poor both through Mission of Mercy and her private practice. Yet through it all, Dr. Alongi remains a humble servant. "I am not anything special," she says.

All those she has touched with her compassion would certainly disagree. Dr. Alongi is *very* special.

2008 By the Numbers

The numbers don't lie: A quick look at the services we delivered in 2008 demonstrates the vital need for our Mission of Mercy in Maryland and Pennsylvania:

Patient Visits (Jan. I – Dec. 31 2008) — 12,742 -- an increase of 1,516 medical visits over 2007

Dental Visits (Jan. I – Dec. 31 2008) — I,098 -- an increase of 268 dental visits over 2007

Prescriptions Dispensed (Jan. I – Dec. 31 2008) — 26,666

Representing 1,688 more dental procedures performed than in 2007



Hail and Farewell



Legacy Donor

During tough economic times such as these, each of us struggles with how to increase our financial support to our favorite charities. We are quite aware that organizations like Mission of Mercy experience a greater demand for their services when times are difficult. We want to help, but are

concerned about reaching further into our already challenged financial resources to make any additional donations. Gifts other than cash could be just the right answer for you. In most cases, they will provide you with income and estate tax advantages as well. Here are a few ideas to consider:

- Gifts of Appreciated Assets These could be investment securities or other assets that have appreciated significantly since you acquired them. That would include assets that you did not purchase but may have received from an estate distribution. These gifts would be eligible, at their current fair-market value, for income tax deduction purposes.
- Gifts Directly from an IRA If you are at least 70 and a half years old, you can make a donation directly from your IRA to Mission of Mercy and it will not be subject to income tax. You will not be able to deduct it as a charitable donation, but you have the advantage of making your contribution from monies that have never been taxed. The maximum contribution you can make is \$100,000.
- Gifts of Life Insurance With cash value insurance policies that you no longer need, you can make an irrevocable gift of the ownership rights to the policy to Mission of Mercy. The gift will be eligible as a tax deduction for you this year. If you are still paying premiums, you can choose to continue making the payments and get further tax deductions, or stop making payments. You should not cash-out the policy to make the gift, however, as this would result in a taxable event for you.

• Gifts of U.S. Savings Bonds – If you have Savings Bonds that are no longer accruing interest, or close to that point, you can cash-out those bonds and gift the proceeds to Mission of Mercy. The amount of accrued interest will be taxable to you, but in many instances, the amount of tax deduction you will receive from making a gift of the full proceeds will offset all, or most, of the tax liability.

All of the above ideas will also result in estate and inheritance tax savings, since the value of the gift(s) will no longer be included in those tax calculations at death. Please contact me by telephone, or email, to discuss these ideas further: 410-857-4811 or jcimino@aMissionofMercy.org
